

WHAT ARE THE OUTCOMES

OF THE CHILD WELFARE SYSTEM

Despite a 5% reduction in cases over the last 5 years, Child Welfare's goal of permanency has worsened.

As of Sept 30, 2020 AFCARS Report:

- 407,493 children and youth in foster care, with a total
 of 631,832 served by the foster care system in 2020,
 5% reduction over 5 years [impact of COVID on
 reduced removals is unclear]
- 117,470 were waiting to adopted, <u>1% increase over 5</u>
 years
- 32.7 months was the average time in care, <u>3%</u> increase over 5 years
- 20.1 months was the average time a child waited for adoption after parental rights were terminated, <u>70%</u> <u>increase over 5 years</u>
- 20,010 (9%) aged-out of the system without ever achieving permanency, despite emancipation being the case goal for only 4%, <u>0% improvement over 5</u> <u>years</u>

Transition-Age Youth (TAY) Supports:

- Only 28 states and D.C. have enacted legislation to extend foster care beyond age 18
- Less than 50% of youth age 16 to 21 receive independent living services to help them become self-sufficient
- 33% of youth age 16-20 have had 5 or more placements
- 40% of 16-17 year olds live in group homes or institutions
- 50% receive Pell grants and 60% receive Chafee grants to help pay for college despite 100% being eligible

Outcomes for Youth Age 19 in Foster Care:

- · 20% have been homeless in the last 2 years
- · 22% have been incarcerated in the last 2 years
- · 32% are enrolled in college
- · 33% dropped out of high school
- · 34% are employed part-time or full-time
- · 44% read at grade level
- 84% desire to go to college

With 4 Years of Aging Out:

- · 70% will be on government assistance
- 50% will be unemployed
- 50% will have experienced periods of homelessness (including couch surfing, sleeping in cars)
- 25% will be homeless
- 8% will have earned a college degree
